



Potential Promotion Board Assessment Increase Update

The National Watermelon Promotion Board met February 24th, in Scottsdale, AZ, in conjunction with the National Watermelon Association Annual Convention. Most notably, following a favorable report on industry support, the Board voted to move forward with a 3 cent per hundredweight increase to the Board's assessment level. This change means a total assessment of 9 cents per hundredweight. This amount is split between growers and shippers and paid in total by importers. The Board staff, overseen by the Executive Committee, will work to submit all necessary documentation to the USDA for the Rulemaking Process which includes a 60-day comment period. During the comment period, industry members are encouraged to share their opinions on the potential assessment increase. New Study Reveals Key Strategies for Merchandising Watermelon

The National Watermelon and Promotion Board (NWPB) announced the release of its latest consumer research and Marketing Guide designed to arm retailers and producers with information to make fact-based

strategic decisions and build awareness of the opportunities within the watermelon category.

The new consumer study, "Watermelon Attitudes and Usage Research," delves into watermelon consumers' ever evolving attitudes, usage, and awareness. Building upon learnings from previous studies, the research focuses on better understanding the watermelon buyer and uncovers opportunities to help build consumer demand. The study examines the demographic segments of watermelon shoppers and reveals the key characteristics and drivers behind their purchasing decisions and consumption patterns.

Key Highlights from the study include:

- Watermelon Purchase and Usage- Dynamics Important purchase drivers that influence the decision to buy watermelon and how consumers use it.
 - o Watermelon is a planned purchase for most buyers. However, craving is the top reason for buying watermelon, whether the decision was made before or during the shopping trip.
- Perceptions of Watermelon- Consumers' attitudes about watermelon, its impact on their well-being, value, and nutritional knowledge.
 - o The study showed watermelon makes people feel happy, boosts their mood, and evokes feelings of nostalgia and comfort.
- Key takeaways of the watermelon buyer's demographic profiles, including their characteristics and personality traits.
 - o Generally, watermelon consumers have a positive outlook, value family, and enjoy being creative in the kitchen.

In addition to the complete research study, the NWPB has also released an inclusive Marketing Guide designed to assist retailers and industry shareholders in effectively reaching and engaging with watermelon core consumers. The guide provides a concise description and demographic profile of watermelon consumers as well as actionable strategies tailored to capitalize on the findings of the study, such as engaging, educating, and stimulating consumers' craving for watermelon. This marketing tool is a guide for successfully promoting and selling watermelon in today's competitive market.

"We are excited to share the results of our latest consumer research and its affiliated Marketing Guide with our industry partners," said Megan McKenna, senior director of marketing and foodservice for the NWPB. "Understanding consumer preferences is crucial for success in the produce industry in today's rapidly evolving landscape. In this feature, we delve into one of the groundbreaking research projects supported by the National Watermelon Association (NWA) through our 2024 Research Grant Program. This initiative, generously funded by NWA, addresses head-on the challenges confronting watermelon growers in their fields. Its primary goal is to find solutions for the pathogens that plague our production.

Suppression of Fusarium Wilt of Watermelon by Mycoviruses

Traditionally, viruses have been considered mainly as pathogens that cause diseases in plants, humans and animals. However, in this project, we are exploring viruses of fungi called mycoviruses (which are not a pathogen of plants) but could be used as a beneficial microorganism to adversely affect fungal virulence with the objective of controlling Fusarium Wilt in watermelon.

Several studies have shown that mycoviruses had adverse effects on the growth and virulence of fungi that can be used as a biological control agent against fungi. Mycoviruses may not have visible symptoms on their host, but they effect the virulence of fungi, which shows how fungi can infect the host, and mostly illustrates itself as hypovirulence. Hypovirulence refers to decreasing the infectious symptom and growth of fungi on its plant host when the fungus is infected with a mycovirus.

Viruses can be used to control fungal diseases and have been a driving force in mycovirus research since the earliest days. Viruses in the family Hypoviridae associated with reduced virulence (hypovirulence) of the chest-nut blight fungus, Cryphonectria parasitica, is a great example in fungal virology. This has been due in part to the severity of the chestnut blight epidemics in North America and Europe and early reports of hypovirulence-mediated mitigation of disease in European forests and successful application for control of chestnut blight. Recently, a more contributing factor has been the development of a hypovirus and C. parasitica experimental system that has overcome many of the challenges associated with mycovirus research.

Our project has the potential to identify various mycoviruses from Fusarium oxysporum f. sp. niveum (FON) isolates, which could express hypovirulence against the Fusarium wilt fungus. Using mycoviruses on fungi provide an opportunity to utilize them as a biocontrol agent rather than using fungicides and/or fumigants, which are costly and can be hazardous to human health and the environment. They have the potential to effectively control Fusarium wilt of watermelon.

At the completion of this project, we hope to identify hypovirulent FON isolates that will have the potential to biologically control Fusarium wilt in watermelon. This hypovirulent culture can be grown and used to inoculate transplant watermelon seedlings which also distributes mycovirus infected isolate throughout the field. This strategy will enable us to formulate long lasting control strategies, which are environmentally friendly, efficient against a particular fungus, and economical.

In the last few years, studies of viruses that infect phytopathogenic fungi are gaining in popularity because of convincing evidence that mycoviruses are responsible for debilitation and/or hypovirulence phenotypes in many economically important plant pathogens. From agricultural perspectives, mycoviruses may contribute to sustainable agriculture as biological control agents. Presently, control of plant pathogenic fungi is a formidable task because of the lack of appropriate and cost effective disease control strategies. In addition to the health hazards and the risks to the environment, the use of fungicides and/or fumigants is often cost prohibitive.

In summary, the more we know about fungal viruses, the more we discredit the idea that all viruses are evil. Mycoviruses are indeed the good guys and hold great promise for exploitation as biological control agents and at the same time they are not pathogens of host plants.



Technology Addressing Ag Labor Issues

As we know, the watermelon industry faces challenges due to high labor costs and labor shortages. Efforts by NWA and coalition partners to address this through changes to regulations and legislation have become the cornerstone of our public policy agenda, and a focus for discussion at our gatherings, but while gridlock in DC prevents movement at federal level, we need to look elsewhere to alleviate some of these roadblocks for watermelon growers.

The good news is that innovators are investing in creating technology that can provide hope for relief for this industry. New technologies and mechanization are providing advacnements for the industry, bringing with them increased productivity, improved working conditions, and fostered employee loyalty and satisfaction. Some specialty crop growers are already reaping the benefits of mechanization and artificial intelligence, installing robots in greenhouses to space, prune, and fertilize plants. Growers are also adopting semi-automated technology like assisted steering. While robots seem like they may be far from our fields, there are inputs and technologies aimed at the watermelon industry as well. During the most recent annual convention, Gilles Mamane of Polyexpert shared how their film products could help reduce labor in the industry.

Additionally, other innovators are looking for ways to bring labor-reducing technologies to the watermelon industry. Mathieu Aspar of M.A.T. Harvesting also addressed the issue of labor cost, stating: "Labor shortages during harvest seasons pose significant challenges in agriculture. The physically demanding nature of tasks like watermelon or Cantaloupe picking exacerbates the issue. However, advancements in technology offer solutions. New technologies, like conveyor belt systems such as those made by Delecroix-Harvesting USA, streamline harvesting, reducing physical strain and increasing efficiency.



While some crops still require manual labor, mechanization plays a vital role in easing the burden. Implementing such technologies not only boosts productivity but also improves working conditions. This fosters worker loyalty and satisfaction, crucial for long-term sustainability."

Despite the financial challenges posed by technological advancements, the industry has shown remarkable resilience and adaptability. Approximately 70% of participating farmers or various crops invested in automation in 2022, as per research conducted by Western Growers. This increased investment in agricultural robotics and mechanization, prompted by concerns about labor shortages, is a testament to the industry's potential for growth and its commitment to overcoming obstacles.

Even as efforts to push for agricultural labor reform in DC are met with political gridlock, there is hope in the belt-way for help with ag labor- through increased federal investment in mechanization and automation for the produce industry. The Specialty Crop Farm Bill Alliance (NWA is a steering committee member of this coalition) has worked with Congress to get a marker bill drafted for increased spending on technologies that could help alleviate the burden of labor costs for growers. We hope to see language from that bill make it into the Farm Bill.

As the cost of labor continues to weigh on our growers, we are looking at multiple angles to find solutions, and our technology suppliers are rising to the occasion.

Ramon Murillo III Foundation's Kicks for Kids Project

We are looking forward to kicking off Haylee's busy spring schedule. Wishing you all a successful season.


